Dear Friends,

Happily, after a two-year hiatus during the worst of COVID, the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Dekalb (UUFD) will resume its Winter Farmers' Markets. We hope that you are safe, well, and able to join us for these popular and festive events!

These markets feature organic, non-GMO, natural food products by local farmers as well as a large variety of artisan crafts by up to 40 vendors. There are baked goods, hearty soup, and many other delicious food items to choose from. There is a commons area set up for people to gather for soup, coffee, tea, hot chocolate, or soda and talk. The markets also include UUFD's popular used book sale in the UUFD library. In addition to all of the vendor activity there is live music all day: A variety of local musicians share their talents from piano to steel guitar, and more. Our markets are festive occasions for vendors and holiday shoppers alike. There is a \$1 admission fee for shoppers.

Out of respect for the more vulnerable among us, masks are required in our building.

Local vendors are invited to contact the Church Office (see contact info above) for a registration form. The deadline for registration is November 10, 2022. Early registration, however, is recommended to guarantee a table.

In August, UUFD members provided a Mexican themed meal of a Cheesy Burrito Casserole, Spanish rice, green salad, fruit, dessert and staples. In September we provided a Crunchy French Onion Beef Casserole main dish, French Bread and butter, tossed salad, fruit, dessert and staples. Let's thank the following volunteers for providing these tasty meals!

August is always a tough month for gathering volunteers for the Hope Haven meal. With vacations and back-to-school activities in motion, everyone is busy, busy, busy! We had a few gaps in the August meal to fill and folks stepped up to fill the gaps. Those of us who made the tasty Cheesy Burrito Casserole made extra, so thank you to Mary Von Zellen and Maylan Dunn-Kenney! It was an easy dish that we will use again in the future. Bonnie Anderson jumped in at the very last moment for a critical part of the meal and provided green salad for 60! Other dishes were provided by: Sharon Blake, Sheryl Nak, Charles Sigwart, Virginia Wilcox and Gretchen Sigwart.

September was a complete turn-around and the sign-up sheet was filled in one week! Volunteers included: Maylan Dunn-Kenney, Beth Schewe, Mary Von Zellen, Rev. Linda Slabon, Toni Tollerud, Charles Sigwart, Sharon Blake, Sheryl Nak, Kim Meyers, Bonnie Anderson, Gretchen Sigwart and Virginia Wilcox.

Conversation with the Kitchen Manager: When delivering the Sept. meal I spent some time with the kitchen manager and a helper, and they were so grateful for the meals we provide. They are averaging about 55 clients per meal, so our quantities have been on target. If they have leftovers, they pull those out for the next day's lunch. I asked if there were any requests and the only thing they said was that they can't handle anything that needs to be cooked. We often bring things to heat up or keep warm in the ovens and that's fine, but one group that provides meals brought raw chicken and they don't have the capacity to prepare dishes like that from start to finish (glad that wasn't us)! They also said there are requests for vegetarian options, so October's meal is meat free with an Easy Tortellini Bake that we've provided in the past.

Hope Haven Recipe Corner

This November the Hope Haven main dish is one we made last March that has become a family favorite in the Lovings house since then. When I was making it in March, it smelled soooo good while it was baking. Of course I had to try it for quality control purposes, and I was hooked! Not only because it was so good, but also because it was so easy to make - a critical qualification for our Hope Haven meals. I have to add a disclaimer. The recipe is called Creamy Turkey Noodles, but I made it with Ham, so I have no idea how it would taste with Turkey. Hope Haven volunteers had the option of using turkey, chicken or ham. However, I don't think I'll ever make it with anything but ham.

Here is the recipe if you'd like to make it for yourself. Just cut the recipe in half.

Creamy Turkey Noodles (Serves 16)

Ingredients

- ◆ 1 pkg. (16 oz.) farfalle (bow-tie pasta), uncooked
- ♦ 1/4 cup butter
- ♦ 1 onion, chopped
- 1 pkg. (16 oz.) frozen mixed vegetables (carrots, corn, green beans, peas)
- ♦ 6 Tbsp. flour
- ♦ 2 cups milk
- ♦ 2 pkg. (7.5 oz. each) Oscar Mayer Carving Board Oven Roasted Turkey Breast, chopped (Or any other chopped meat)
- 2 cans (10-3/4 oz.) reduced-sodium condensed cream of chicken soup
- ♦ 1 cup sour cream
- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) Kraft Shredded Three Cheese with a Touch of Philadelphia
- (I used Italian blend with some added shredded parmesan for more kick)

Instructions

- 1. Heat oven to 350 degrees
- 2. Cook pasta as directed on package, omitting salt.
- 3. Meanwhile, melt butter in Dutch oven or large deep skillet on medium heat. Add onions; cook and stir 4 min. or until crisp-tender. Add frozen vegetables; cook 4 min. or until thawed, stirring frequently. Stir in flour until blended; cook and stir 1 min. Gradually stir in milk; bring to boil. Cook and stir 2 min. or until thickened. Remove from heat. Stir in turkey, soup and sour cream.
- 4. Drain pasta. Add to sauce; stir until evenly coated. Spoon into 2 (13x9-inch) pans sprayed with cooking spray; top with cheese.
- 5. Cover. Bake 30 min. or until heated through, uncovering for the last 10 min.

Tip: These casseroles can be mixed together ahead of time. Wrap tightly and freeze up to 3 months. When ready to serve, thaw overnight in refrigerator, then bake as directed. Or, bake frozen casserole(s), covered, 1 hour 20 min. or until heated through, uncovering for the last 10 min Enjoy!
